I. Status on COVID-19 Public Health Emergency & District Recovery

April 2022 begins the third-year cycle for pandemic and emergency declarations regarding COVID-19, including LACCD, that were formally declared back in March 2020. Just when recovery from the pandemic seemed likely, a new mutation of the Omicron variant has now caused an uptick in positive cases in countries around the world, including the U.S., China and elsewhere. However, other pandemic measurements such as hospitalization rates and deaths, at least locally, have not yet seen the dramatic surge as with Omicron and the Delta variants.

Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LACDPH) officials continue to monitor and track the situation closely and to be in regular communication with LACCD and other Institutes of Higher Education through telebriefings, emails and website updates. Local health orders remain in place based upon metrics indicating the region is at low risk for community transmission. Health Orders for the public for indoor and outdoor masking have been reduced to recommended instead of mandatory. Health officials continue to strongly recommend that all persons who are eligible should be fully vaccinated and receive their first and second boosters.

For LACCD and its nine colleges, Board Policies 2800 (indoor masking) and 2900 (vaccinations & exemptions/testing) currently remain in effect until further notice.

The District's Emergency Operations Center and the colleges' Incident Command Centers have scaled back operational status to monthly coordination meetings. All employee and student accounts via Cleared4 remain active for daily check-in purposes and scanning stations at all locations have been enhanced with the in-person return-to-work directive from the Chancellor.

Free Biocept COVID-19 testing services at all nine colleges and the District's downtown offices remain available for all employees and students regardless of vaccination status. Thousands of antigen, personal-use test kits have been distributed to employees and students. Ample supplies of these test kits, disposable masks and hand sanitizers are also available throughout the District at no charge to employees or students. All of the colleges continue to work with

outside healthcare providers via LACDPH or with the college's Student Health Center to provide vaccinations clinics.

In terms of the emergency itself, LACDPH have no timeline projections for when the actual emergency declarations by either the County or City of Los Angeles might be rescinded. At the same time, most public health officials believe the coronavirus and its many variants will never be fully eradicated and society will have to adjust to the COVID-19 presence and consequences akin to flu by taking precautions with vaccinations, medicine for treatment when infected. masking as needed and quarantine/isolation protocols when outbreaks occur. In some instances, such as the recent decisions by health and government officials in Philadelphia, Penn., and in China, mandatory masking and quarantines might continue to be necessary for the foreseeable future.

The District continues to remind all employees and students to be up to date with their COVID-19 vaccines by getting a booster as



II. Updates on LACCD Enrollment & Marketing for L.A. College Promise

Enrollment Marketing for L.A. College Promise

A three-month, Districtwide marketing and advertising campaign throughout the Los Angeles media market begins later this month by the District's Office of Communications & External Relations in conjunction with the Educational Programs and Institutional Effectiveness Division and Elder Tree, the District's advertising Agency of Record, as well as Univision.

The campaign kicks off this Friday, April 15 with special tribute ads for Jackie Robinson Day during Univision's sports radio broadcast of the Dodgers game versus the Cincinnati Reds on KTNQ 1020AM and its sister station KLVE 107.5FM.

Radio, television, cable television, sports programming, outdoor billboards, bus shelters, bus ads, digital streaming, radio streaming, social media, direct mail, SEO geo-fencing and email nudging are among the multiple platforms to be used between April and early August. The campaign will be done in English, Spanish and Chinese with other languages integrated in targeted areas.

Later this month, the first of more than 20, large outdoor billboards will be strategically deployed near the colleges and along major thoroughfares emphasizing the Promise Program with the message (and images) of "Our Promise, Your Path" along with Free Tuition! and Free Public Transit!

The "Out Of Home" (OHH) will also include a suite of complementary graphic marketing materials including 18 bus shelters posters (two shelters per college); 90 on-side bus ads on Metro buses (10 per college) with service routes going past the colleges and 100 inside the bus advertising cards. The materials will be primarily in English and Spanish and some in Chinese.

As a primary partner, Univision will be taping with the Chancellor a series of on-air talk show interviews about the Promise programming and his broadcast-quality voice will be recorded for a series of radio announcements on Univision stations. Univision was also instrumental in reviewing collateral material.

More than 300 ads are being planned with Spectrum cable television for exclusive use on its official Dodger cable network, both the English and Spanish channels. There will be extensive radio and radio internet streaming ads placed with iHeart and a special; a special three-page advertising insert section is planned for May in La Opinion and additional advertising in the L.A. Sentinel, L.A. Watts Times and the L.A. Times are being planned as well.

Most digital and print ads will have QR codes to drive viewers to a special landing page for metrics and measurements, which, in turn, will send people to the <u>apply page</u> of the L.A. College Promise website. Broadcast advertising will directly drive audiences to the L.A. College Promise <u>homepage address</u>.

III. Foundation for the Los Angeles Community Colleges

The Foundation is processing scholarships, grant awards and donor reports for the 2021-22 academic year. The Foundation is also soliciting philanthropic contributions and developing initiatives that will support LACCD students in the 2021-22 academic year.

"LOC Scholars" Program

The Foundation received a generous contribution from the Leonetti O'Connell Family Foundation to create the LOC Scholars Program at Los Angeles Southwest College. (LASC). Through this program, 45 Los Angeles College Promise students at LASC have received \$700 for books and supplies and will receive an additional four monthly payments of \$1,000 in Spring 2022. This pilot program offers financial assistance via grants to community college students when they might not think to apply for emergency aid. These stipends are intended to preemptively reduce stress, improve the recipient's ability to focus on school, and ultimately incentivize them to complete their program of study rather than drop out.

"I would like to personally thank you for this scholarship that will help me during these difficult times. Throughout this pandemic, I have lost 3 jobs and, at one point, barely had enough money for food for my daughter ... With this scholarship, I will be able to buy all my books for the 4 classes that I need. Support for Urgent Needs

The Foundation continues to provide emergency aid scholarships to students experiencing unexpected hardships that make it challenging to complete their studies. This academic year, the Foundation has awarded more than 250 students with urgent need support with \$500 scholarships; grocery gift cards and internet hotspots.



immigrants, students, and communities of color.


ELAC Music Professor Performs at Walt Disney Concert Hall


live concerts and collaborate with the wonderful musicians from the Los Angeles Philharmonic orchestra," Nargizyan said.

L.A. Southwest Celebration with Congresswoman Maxine Waters for \$1.5 Million Appropriation

LASC celebrated the awarding of \$1.5 million to fund a Re-Entry Initiative for Success in Education (RISE) Center and a Family Resource Center on Wednesday, March 23. The funds will both provide services and resources to students from underserved populations to help them continue and complete their education at LASC. The federal funding was part of



the recently passed omnibus appropriations bill, H.R. 2471, the "Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2022." Procedural vehicles for these allocations are Community Project Funding, which provide for direct funding for specific projects in larger spending bills. LASC's proposal was sponsored by United States Congresswoman Maxine Waters (D-CA 43rd District). "I am delighted that I was able to

secure \$1.5 million for Los Angeles Southwest College to launch new student support centers," said Congresswoman Waters. "These centers will provide services and resources to students from underserved populations to help them continue their education, thus



reducing barriers to higher education and promoting economic mobility in our community." The proposed RISE Center aims to support student Anti-Recidivism and Gang Intervention efforts, primarily focused on supporting justice-impacted individuals. The proposed Family Resource Center looks to be transformational in support of retention and student success efforts for student-parents.

Netflix's Last Chance U, which had been profiling ELAC throughout their season, was on hand to catch all the action in the East West showdown that resulted in West's 19 straight victory. Final score 85-73.







The local celebration followed Head Coach Jones reaching the significant milestone of his 100th victory at West just two weeks earlier. "It has never been about getting wins it's about my student-athletes becoming successful," said Jones. And his students do realize success both on and off the court. Since 2015, the team GPA has steadily increased under Coach Jones' direction from 2.51 to 3.02 in 2018, to 3.6 in Fall 2021. In the same time period, 100 percent of sophomores graduated and transferred to four-year universities including several who went on to play ball at the university level.



As Wildcats boarded their bus bound for the quarterfinals in Lemoore, California on Thursday, March 10, faculty, staff and friends cheered them on and wished them good luck which was not needed. Skill won the day with the Wildcats emerging 77-64 over Las Positas on Friday, March 11.



West used a 17-4 run over the final 9:20, breaking what had been a 60-60 tie. Las Positas, which got off to a fast start, struggled down the stretch. The Hawks made just one their final eight shots in the final four and half minutes. In the final nine minutes, Las Positas managed just two baskets.

"Slow starts have been our thing all year, unfortunately," Anthony Jones, head coach of West Los Angeles, said. "We've talked about it, and I have changed a bunch of things to try and address it, but it has continued throughout the year."

Roy Clarke, an all-state selection for West, led the Wildcats with 18 points, 11 of his points come in the first half. His seven second-half points came in the final nine minutes and over a 5:28 stretch when the Wildcats put together its 17-4 run. Teammate Matthew Mayes added 11. "These guys have answered the call all year," Jones said.
