

I. District Status on COVID-19 Public Health Emergency & Recovery

In January, Los Angeles County marked the one-year anniversary since the first case of the COVID-19 coronavirus was reported. The County has since logged more than 1.12 million positive cases but the alarming, out-of-control surge of positive cases during the past several months appears to have peaked as daily totals are declining, according to officials with the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LACDPH).



LACDPH also noted that as of February 2, 2021, total deaths were 17,057, with 7,000 of those coming in just about the past 30 days. By comparison, on December 30, 2020, LACDPH reported a total of 10,000 COVID-19 deaths since the pandemic began.


As daily cases have declined, the Stay-at-Home Health Orders were lifted and replaced with the <u>Safer At Work and the Community</u> protocols. Some activities like outdoor dining have been allowed to return under the revised <u>Health Orders</u> effective January 29, 2021. The

County, however, remains in the most restrictive, Tier 1/Purple Level and it is unknown when the County will move out of this restrictive tier to allow for more activities. Protocols for Institutes of Higher Education continue to be posted online and were last revised by LACDPH on December 20, 2020.

While prevention, contact tracing and control remains key to the LACDPH COVID-19 response, Health Officials tell the District the focus is now on vaccinations. The challenge is receiving enough supplies to meet demand. The County is receiving about 150,000 doses of vaccine weekly and is still working through Phase 1A (healthcare and long-term care homes) and the pool of people ages 65 or older. These groups represent about 2 million people locally with a total need of 4 million doses, but only less than 1 million does have been received. Of the vaccines received, about 800,000 people have received their first dose and about 125,000 have now received both doses.

County officials tell the District that LACDPH will being opening appointments to Phase 1B, including the Education category, sometime in February. Although no specific dates have been announced, appointments for Education could begin in mid- to late-February. During this time, LACDPH urges all to have patience while supplies and other logistic issues are resolved. In addition, there is a renewed emphasis on the basics of protection, including staying home if sick, wearing facial coverings/masks outdoors, social distancing, frequent hand washing and avoiding any large crowds or gatherings.

Overall, the District and its nine colleges continue to remain open with business operations primarily online. Educational efforts continue to be done in remote learning platforms with some limited, in-person instruction for essential workforce classes. The situation remains status quo for the Spring 2021 Semester that begins Monday, February 8, 2021. No announcements have been made yet for the Summer Session or Fall 2021 Semester.

The District's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and the colleges' Incident Command Centers (ICCs) remain activated and are meeting on a weekly to twice-weekly basis as needed for emergency supplies and procurement, logistics, recovery, communications and financial purposes.

A new recovery <u>"Re-engagement Grid"</u> document for the District and the colleges has been developed to help guide the resumption of activities as the County is able to move out of the Purple/Tier 1 restrictions. A companion memo was also developed and posted online.

The EOC is also reviewing all 21 <u>Safety Advisories</u> issued since the pandemic was declared in March 2020 to update and revise as appropriate.

Promotion of the SAFE app for the colleges, including check-in protocols on college access, continues, along with the general safety messages.





The District continues to provide important representation for the higher education sector within Los Angeles County with the LACDPH Vaccine Advisory Work Group. The Group has now finalized draft documents under review by LACDPH executives for presentation soon to the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors.

The District and the colleges continue to cooperate and provide assistance to the County and its agency partners as both testing sites and now as potential sites as Points of Distribution (PODs)

for vaccinations. These proposals go through the colleges' ICCs up to the EOC for review and approval before operations are allowed to begin.

Also, under review are MOUs that will allow LACCD healthcare students to help administer vaccinations as PODs continue to expand and more personnel are need to serve the public.

II. Updates on LACCD Enrollment / Marketing for Enrollment

A. Winter 2021 Enrollment

Comparing Winter 2021 (1/28/21) to Winter 2020 (1/30/20) as of Day +24 of the semester, for the District as a whole:

- Headcount is at 98%.
- Duplicated Enrollment is at 98%,
- · Credit Section Count is at 98%, and
- Enrollment per Section is at 100%

B. Spring 2021 Enrollment

Comparing Spring 2021 (2/1/21) to Spring 2020 (2/3/20) as of Day -7 of the semester, for the District as a whole:

- Headcount is at 87%,
- Duplicated Enrollment is at 82%,
- · Credit Section Count is at 90%, and
- Enrollment per Section is at 91%

Spring enrollment has increased at a lower rate likely due to a multitude of factors, especially due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the burgeoning surge of cases and deaths during the past few months. Uncertainty about the economy and the extension of unemployment benefits; childcare issues and no in-classroom education at the K-12 level; mental fatigue; and other societal or political impacts may also be contributing factors.

Class offerings are also declining as colleges continue to cancel classes at a rate that is approaching that for Fall 2020

Districtwide enrollment marketing and advertising for the Spring Semester will continue through next week to help capture additional student enrollments.

The current marketing strategy was developed with input from the colleges and focused on retaining current students, supporting college enrollment and recruiting diverse students. At the colleges' request, special emphasis was developed to students who had applied but not yet enrolled. The external marketing and outreach activities targeted the following: a) Latinos (bilingual), African Americans, Asian American, and Pacific Islander students ages 18 to 35 and their parents; b) L.A. County residents searching online with the intent to enroll in community college; and c) 4-year college students looking for higher education alternatives.

The multiplatform campaign is using social media, emails, geofencing, website landing pages, college-branding messaging, traditional advertising (print, TV and radio).



This month, the District is once again working with the Los Angeles Unified School District to mail out the "L.A. College Promise Digital Welcome Kit" to all seniors with an emphasis to apply now for priority registration May 1, 2021 to join the L.A. College Promise Program for the Fall 2021 Semester. The kit has been updated and is now published in English and Spanish.



As LAUSD does its mailing, the District will be publishing the kit online and via social media in addition to working with other area school districts to distribute to their seniors.

III. Foundation for the Los Angeles Community Colleges

Michael Fuller, LACCD Director for Institutional Advancement, shared the following report with Board of Directors for the Foundation for the Los Angeles Community Colleges:

Dear Foundation Board Members,

In normal times, we would have seen each other at events or crossed paths in other ways during the Fall season. We would have connected in December for our annual Foundation holiday gathering. I certainly miss the human-to-human connections and seeing everyone in person.

But during this time, our tiny-but-mighty Advancement Team has been able to maximize our remote environments to provide an unprecedented level of assistance to students and their families. Just yesterday, we sent the final list for the Food for Families program to have boxes of food delivered directly to the homes of students.

As Directors of the Foundation, you are part of something larger than any one of us as individuals. You are the part of the vital thread that holds together the fabric of our society. In the past three months alone, your Foundation did this.


- We mailed 2,700 Grocery Cards to students' homes.
- Collaborating with Imperfect Foods Inc., we delivered:
 - o 970 Boxes of Food and Groceries to students' homes in December and,
 - 2.442 Boxes of Food and Groceries to students' homes in January.
- We disbursed:
 - 201 Vicky Chang NCLEX awards to Nursing Students.
 - 105 Ann and Robert Ronus Nursing Persistence Grants.
 - 13 scholarships to respiratory therapy students.

- o 123 Emergency Grants.
- 183 LA College Promise Grants.
- With help from College faculty and staff, we processed and evaluated more than 11,000 applications for assistance.
- In addition to the \$1 Million grant from the California Community Foundation, we generated \$410,000 in contributions.

While we have certainly tested the limits of our capacity, the motivation to help students has never waned. A great spirit of collaboration with the Los Angeles Valley College Family Resource Center Team got us through the long hours and weekends. But we know that none of this would have been possible without your steadfast help and support.

As January draws to a close and a new semester begins, we look forward to the hopeful year ahead that brings the possibility of connecting in person. Thank you for all that you do. I look forward connecting with you virtually at our next Board meeting on Tuesday, February 23. In the meantime, I'll be reaching out to you individually to get your thoughts on new projects, and to follow up on committee business.

IV. Black History Month Activities



V. Special Notes and Updates

Districtwide Security

The District is moving forward with its plans for a comprehensive and inclusive assessment of campus safety and security needs for the District. The Board of Trustees previously approved a short-term contract with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department for such services during this time. The goal is to have the assessment completed during the next four to five months. This assessment will serve as the foundation for a request for proposals for campus safety and security services in order to have a new districtwide provider no later than January 1, 2022. More details about the assessment will be announced later this month.

District State Legislative Agenda for 2021 Announced

LACCD is pursuing an ambitious state legislative and budgetary agenda in 2021. The District is prioritizing solutions to systemic issues impacting student success across all nine colleges and supporting measures and budget items to implement equitable programming reflective of its diverse student population.

There are six legislative policy priorities and seven budget priorities which focus on issues such as housing insecurity and homelessness; funding for Ethnic Studies programs to meet associate and bachelor's degree requirements in LACCD and the CSU system, and four years of tuition-free education at CSU campuses for some students.

Free WiFi Connections for Students at LACCD Colleges

The District's Facilities Division, the Office of Information Technology and the <u>BuildLACCD</u> program have been collaborating with the colleges to bring free WiFi connectivity to the nine colleges for students on a limited basis. First up was <u>Los Angeles Valley College</u> and the other colleges will be brought online in phases during the Spring 2021 semester. The WiFi will be for students only while in their cars in order to access their student portal for services and learning. More information about the rollout, reservations and other safety logistics will be announced as soon as possible.

The first phase is a temporary solution to provide WiFi access while BuildLACCD, Facilities, IT pursue expanded and more permanent solutions for reliable outdoor WiFi access for students. Parking structures and lots were identified for use to enable students to drive to the colleges and stay in their vehicles while
