I. District Updates

The LACCD honored the five-term Mayor of Los Angeles Tom Bradley on the occasion of what would have been his 100th birthday, by re-naming Redwood Hall on the LA Trade Tech campus as the "Tom Bradley Center for Student Life". More than 100 former Bradley staffers, friends, students and employees joined Bradley's daughters, Lorraine and Phyllis, in a ribbon-cutting ceremony and a celebration of the mayor's achievements. Board of Trustees President Sydney Kamlager-Dove was the emcee, and attending the event were Board of Trustees members Mike Fong and Scott Svonkin, a former Bradley staffer, along with Chancellor Francisco Rodriguez. Redwood Hall was one of the original buildings on the campus of Polytechnic High School, when it was located on the grounds of where LA Trade Tech now stands. Bradley attended that high school and became its first African-American student body president. A ten-tiered cake was presented at the reception and a permanent historical exhibit is now displayed in the Bradley Center chronicling the late mayor's contributions to Los Angeles.

Dr. Mary Gallagher began her role as Interim President at LA City College on January 2. The LA City College president search committee holds its first meeting today. Community College Search Services (CCSS) is coordinating the executive search.

The search committee for the permanent president at LA Southwest College is expected to meet later this month and the job will be posted in late January/early February. PPL, Inc. is coordinating the executive search.

Vice Chancellor Ryan Cornner and Chancellor Rodriguez will visit the accrediting commission on Thursday, January 11, in San Jose, as part of for a presentation to the Commission. The ACCJC has received all nine college and district Follow-Up Reports and will determine our accreditation standing moving forward.

Foundation for the Los Angeles Community Colleges Year in Review

This past year we have been making steady progress in strengthening the Foundation for the Los Angeles Community Colleges. The Los Angeles College Promise gave us renewed motivation for helping students. The results of the year-long push from all areas, communications, fundraising and outreach were extraordinary. As compared to last year, we had 14% growth in the number of LAUSD students enrolling in LACCD's Colleges.

Even more remarkable is the increase to 40% in the number of those students who enrolled full time. Full time enrollment is the most significant factor in the likelihood that a student will complete an associate's degree, transfer to a 4-year college or earn a workforce certificate. Foundation fundraising along with the commitment from The Mayor's Fund for Los Angeles made this possible.

Establishing comprehensive advancement operations with innovative software, sound accounting policies and procedures focusing on the distribution of funds to help students, puts the Foundation in place to help our community college students as never before. Synergistically, the growth and renewed energy at the Foundation has uncovered new opportunities to assist students.

Corporate funding from Southern California Edison (SCE) was secured to assist the nine LACCD college foundations by providing professional development resources, instituting uniform management and fundraising practices at each campus, and providing funding for software to facilitate the distribution and management of scholarships and grants. Additionally, SCE funds and contributions from donor advised funds were committed to support students studying in STEM majors across the District's Colleges.

The Foundation entered into its first ever planned giving agreement with author and educator Mike Rose. Through a bequest, Mike is leaving the residue of his estate to establish an endowment that will provide emergency funds for students with unexpected expenses.

We continue to hone the stewardship of Vicky Chang's \$2M gift to assist LACCD's nursing students with taking the NCLEX exam. We have distributed funds to help more than 345 students thus far and continue to award grants to nursing graduates. With each semester we improve the process to make it more efficient and meaningful for our students.

We have strategically pursued funding from private Foundations and individuals in support of our mission to help students. With \$200,000 from the California Community Foundation and \$100,000 from Ralph M. Parsons Foundation, we have established relationships that are vital and help garner future support.

For 2018, with a new Director of Communications, we will spend more time and focus building the Foundation, honing our strategy and building support. The Foundation Board has revised and updated its bylaws. A comprehensive strategic plan for the foundation is being developed and will be approved by the board at its annual meeting.

II. Fall 2017 Enrollment Update

Based on four email distributions to date, 29,345 students who received an email or social media impression or were served a digital display advertisement have enrolled. A link within the sent emails directing potential students to the class schedule or to the LACCD enrollment web page has been clicked 20,771 times.

The social media campaign has produced 1.3 million impressions with 21,478 individuals clicking through the advertisements to visit individual college websites. Digital display remarking advertisements have been served 286,621 times to those individuals who have visited one of the college websites. The campaign will continue in January and early February with eight additional emails and more social media and digital advertisements. As of Day 35 (Jan.1, 2018 vs Jan. 2, 2017), Spring 2018 headcount was 80% of Spring 2017 headcount.

As of Day 6 of the Winter semester, comparing Winter 2018 (1/7/17) to Winter 2017 (1/8/17):

- Headcount is 12% lower,
- **Duplicated Enrollment** is 10% lower,
- Credit Section Count is 12% lower, and
- Enrollment per Section is 2% higher.

As of Day 29 of the Spring semester, comparing Spring 2018 (1/7/17) to Spring 2017 (1/8/17):

- **Headcount** is 18% lower,
- **Duplicated Enrollment** is 20% lower,
- Credit Section Count is 4% lower, and
- Enrollment per Section is 17% lower.

Spring 2018 enrollments, while down compared to Spring 2017 are running ahead of those for Fall. Based on Day 29 enrollment, comparing Fall 2017 and Fall 2016, headcount was down 22% and duplicated enrollment was down 24%.

III. Reports from the College Presidents

Los Angeles Harbor College

- The Nursing Department celebrated the graduation of our Nursing Students on Friday, December 15 in Music Recital Hall.
- Saturday, December 16, Congresswoman Maxine Waters hosted a Town Hall meeting in our Gym for the community, which was well attended.
- Harbor Faculty and Administration will be hosting a College Enrollment Summit, January 11.
- Harbor Teacher Prep Academy will host a National Blue Ribbon School Celebration on January 18, in Harbor's Music Recital Hall.

Los Angeles Mission College

- Los Angeles Mission College left its footprint right in the heart of the community on Saturday, December 16 as it marched up Van Nuys Boulevard during the Pacoima Holiday Parade. The college arrived with a diverse group of students, faculty, staff and administrators representing all corners of the campus.
- In response to campus closures resulting from the nearby Creek fire, several offices and departments opened on Saturday, December 9 and Sunday December 10 to assist students in preparing for finals week. The Learning Resource Center was open from 8 a.m.-8 p.m. and saw more than 200 students stop by for help from tutors and faculty members who volunteered their time. Academic Affairs, Student Services and Culinary Arts also opened their doors, providing students with refreshments over the intense weekend study session.
- Maria Granados, a coordinator with Foster/Kinship Care Education, was recently recognized by the Ad Council and featured in a Public Service Announcement (PSA) encouraging high school completion. The PSA features 30-year-old Carissa, who credits Ms. Granados with inspiring her to complete her high school diploma. Foster/Kinship Care Education is a statewide program that provides a variety of training programs for foster parents through California Community Colleges.
- Students from the inaugural Biotechnology class presented their group work during a special exhibition on Thursday, December 14 at the Center for Math and Science. The groups presented on Producing Electricity from Wastewater; Controlling Environmental Pollutants; Genome Editing in Beauty and Medical Products; Bioinformatics and Cancer Treatment; and Bioengineering and Laser Technology in Food Quality Control.
- Metro Bus Lines 230 and 234 have been modified to terminate at a new location inside Los Angeles Mission College's East Campus. The new terminal will provide improved access for our students. New stops have been added along Eldridge Avenue.
