I. District Updates

DACA/Immigration Task Force Meeting

On March 1, the DACA Immigration Task Force, co-chaired by Trustee Buelna and Chancellor Rodriguez, met at East Los Angeles College. More than 30 students, staff, faculty and President Marvin Martinez attended the meeting. Mr. Gene Kim of Imprenta Communications and Miguel and Andres Orozco of Novelas Educativas gave an update on the undocumented student social media campaign. Jonathan Flores, District Representative for Senator Lara, provided information on SB 573 (Lara) – Student Service Programs which, if passed, would provide a "work study" look-alike program for undocumented students. The meeting concluded with updates from the Campus Dream Centers. The meeting was broadcast live on the LACCD Facebook page, https://www.facebook.com/LACCD/ and is available for archived viewing. To date, the video has been viewed 609 times, with 42 likes and 17 shares.

<u>Human Resources External Assessment Ad Hoc Task Team</u>

The Human Resources External Assessment Ad Hoc Task Team met twice in February. The first meeting was to discuss the individual Task Team members' evaluation of the responses to the District-issued Request for Qualifications (RFQ) based on the criteria within the RFQ and to determine which responses would receive an interview with the Task Team. The second meeting was to engage in the interviews and determine which responsive bidder would be recommended to the Board of Trustees for engagement at the Board's March 7, 2018 meeting.

Sexual Assault, Sexual Harassment, and Title IX Ad-Hoc Committee

On February 28 the Sexual Assault, Sexual Harassment, and Title IX Committee chaired by Trustee Andra Hoffman met. Ms. Kristine Kwong, Esq. of Musick, Peeler & Garrett presented to the Task Force on Hostile Work Environment, Bullying, and Harassment in the Workplace. The presentation covered the following areas of interest:

- The difference between sexual discrimination and sexual harassment.
- The "Protected Status" categories of harassment and the criteria needed to meet them. She also discussed the importance of addressing any behavior that is cause for concern because, while the behavior may not be unlawful in the sense that it does not violate a protected status category, it can become unlawful or be construed as unlawful by the courts. An example of this type of behavior is bullying.
- Vicarious liability and the responsibility of the organization in the event that a supervisor is accused of harassment. She explained the concept of the "Should Have Known" standard that holds the organization responsible when they should have been aware of the supervisor's actions, and emphasized the importance of mandatory harassment training at all levels of management.
- Sensitivity awareness. Ms. Kwong provided examples of barriers to inclusion and ways to overcome differences in order to establish a culture of inclusion.

The next meeting of Ad-Hoc Committee will be held on March 14, 2018. The meeting topics will include a review of non-Title IX complaints, as well as a review of Administrative Regulation C-14.

Foundation for the Los Angeles Community Colleges

The steps in the cycle for developing gifts are: identify, qualify, strategize, cultivate, solicit, acknowledge, steward and renew. We are operating at all stages of this continuum with prospects and donors, in addition to implementing awarding operations.

Three Foundations have been identified to which we will soon submit proposals for future funding. We met with staff from two of these Foundations to get advice regarding strategy and alignment with their funding priorities. This is an important part of the cultivation process and we have first drafts for two of them.

The Mayor's Fund for Los Angeles was sent an invoice for the first cohort of the Los Angeles College Promise students. After the Foundation for the Los Angeles Community Colleges receives the funds, a check will be made to LACCD for \$536,303.00 to cover the tuition for the first semester for L.A. College Promise students. We will send a report to donors regarding the L.A. College Promise and plan a "Thank You" event as a fundraiser to help future students with the costs of textbooks, tools, transportation and food.

Payden & Rygel hosted a meeting to present an overview of how endowment funds generate revenue in perpetuity. The meeting included a major donor and finance and audit committee leadership from the Foundation Board. The Foundation has awarded \$175,532.00 to 392 nursing students to help cover the cost for them to prepare and take the NCLEX Exam. The goal is to endow this program for all future nursing students.

II. Update on the LACCD Enrollment and Strategic Marketing Campaign

As of Day 27 of the Spring semester:

- Spring 2018 Headcount is 94% of Spring 2017
- Spring 2018 Duplicated Enrollment is 91% of Spring 2017
- Spring 2018 Credit Section Count is 93% of Spring 2017
- Spring 2018 Enrollment per Section is 98% of Spring 2017

The colleges have been actively working to assist students with enrollment in late start classes.

Following the initial results of the "I'm On It" social media campaign by Interact Communications, the District will be working again with Interact to conduct a comprehensive communications/media survey across all nine colleges. The survey will document the preferred means of communication by and to students—how they communicate and digest information; their media platforms of choice, including social media sites, how frequently they use different platforms, as well as the platforms they do not use. This data will be used to improve communication and marketing campaigns by strategically and efficiently using those platforms most utilized by students, leading to more effective communication, more informed choices for outreach and greater return on investment for marketing efforts.

III. Reports from the College Presidents

Los Angeles City College

- On Thursday, February 1, the District Academic Senate sponsored a day-long summit on AB 705 implementation at L.A. City College. More than 250 district/college and statewide participants attended to obtain a better understanding of the reform legislation.
- On Monday, February 5, City Talk Presents: A conversation on DACA with noted feminist and activist Gloria Steinem and entrepreneur and visionary Samantha Ramirez-Herrera.
- A national executive team from the Telemundo network visited with students from LACC on Monday, February 26 to discuss current issues, media habits, etc. Telemundo conducted an interview of a DACA student.

East Los Angeles College

• The Executive Committee of the Academic Senate of the California Community Colleges has selected ELAC Nursing faculty member Brenda Chan for the 2017-18 Hayward Award. The Hayward Award recognizes outstanding community college faculty who have a track record of excellence both in teaching and in professional activities, and have demonstrated a commitment to their students, profession and college. Brenda Chan has served as a leader in her discipline, college and the community while dedicating her life to the educational advancement of her students.

The award presentation will be held at a future meeting of the Board of Governors for the California Community Colleges.

 ELAC kicks off its second GO (Greater Outcomes) Program in Southeast Los Angeles from 10-11:30 a.m., Wednesday, March 7 at Bell High School. The program's purpose is to create a college-going culture for all students in the K-12 system in Southeast Los Angeles. The program is a partnership between the college, LAUSD and Cal State LA.

Los Angeles Harbor College

- Harbor's Umoja and ASO hosted a Black History and Culture Showcase on February 28, in the Seahawk Quad area.
- In March, Harbor Advantage and LA College Promise will host "Majors March."
 Different majors will be highlighted throughout the month on Tuesdays, Wednesdays
 and Thursdays to help students declare a major and choose the right pathway for their
 future. A kick-off event was held March 1 in the Music Recital Hall with special guests:
 Deputy Mayor Brenda Shockley, Councilman Ryu, and Steve Zimmer, Senior Advisor,
 Education Policy and Economic Opportunity from L.A. Mayor Garcetti's Office.

Los Angeles Mission College

- Los Angeles Mission College hosted a special event March 5 commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the East L.A. Walkouts: Chicano Blowouts and El Plan de Santa Barbara. Students and faculty were able to meet the founders of these two historic events that helped shape the Chicano movement and led to many changes in elementary, secondary and higher education across California and the nation. A panel discussion with the original student and community leaders that participated in the Blowouts and the UC Santa Barbara Conference, which was the genesis of El Plan de Santa Barbara occurred in the Arts, Media, and Performance Theater.
- Four theater students have been recognized by the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival for their work on the recent fall production of *Peter and the Starcatcher*. Costume designers Jasmine Cabadas and Angel Mia Tristan received Meritorious Achievement Awards for their colorful and whimsical pirate-themed costumes. Actors Bethany Redwood and Sienna Wescott received nominations for the Irene Ryan Scholarship Award and were invited to compete in the national competition in Mesa, Arizona. Sixteen regional and two national scholarships are awarded annually by the Irene Ryan Foundation. Redwood and Wescott will be reprising their roles as Slank and Smee when *Peter and the Starcatcher* returns to L.A. Mission College's Arts, Media and Performance Theater March 15–24.
- The Art Gallery is featuring the work of painter Diane Hiscox. *Home: Everyone is Someone* uses small-format paintings depicting figures which are immediately identifiable as people (and sometimes their dogs) who live on sidewalks, but there is reference made in the use of wallpaper and the figures' belongings to the notion of home. Curated by Professor Thomas Folland, Ph.D., the exhibit runs until March 10.

Los Angeles Pierce College

- The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program began February 3, 2018 with 69 students enrolled in the course to assist people with the tax returns. As of February 14, more than 50 tax returns have been filed and we expect to assist another 250 to 300 students before the deadline to file. People will be assisted on a first-come, first serve basis from 9 a.m. to Noon, March 3, 10, 17 and 24.
- Seventeen students participated in the Region 3 Skills USA competition on February 2. Eleven students are advancing to the State level in photography, digital cinema, early childhood education, audio radio production, architectural design and architectural drafting.

Los Angeles Southwest College

• On February 28, the college celebrated a special groundbreaking for its new School of Sciences building.

Los Angeles Trade-Tech

- LATTC received a written commitment for a grant from the California Energy Commission of \$1.35 million to increase the quality, access and availability of training or careers and jobs related to the alternative fuel industry.
- Our fourth cohort of the ARC Apprenticeship Prep; our third cohort of the Veterans'
 Culinary programs at Patriotic Hall; our second cohort of our Rail Systems Tech, and
 the second cohort of the Hire LAX Apprenticeship prep are all going strong.
 Organizations such as Metro, ARC, LA County Fed, US Vets, LA/OC Building Trades,
 multiple Work Source Centers and Patriotic Hall veterans' services are partners in
 training programs that will lead students to great careers.
- The Project Impact Award has been given to the Friends Outside, a subcontractor with the Work Source Center on our campus that brings a full-time attorney to do Prop 47 and expungement work, along with a behavioral counselor on campus.
- On February 22, LATTC's "Avanza Los Angeles" or ALAS, began offering Spanish-language instruction to hundreds of community members from around Trade Tech. For many of these students, this is the first time they have set foot on a college campus. The program offers classroom and lab training in several programs including fashion design and automotive. The commitment from the student is to take ESL classes once a week. The effort is designed to eventually transition these students in English-language training on campus, with placement on a career pathway.
- On February 23, more than 200 faculty, staff, students, administrators, and allies attended the District's first-ever Transgender Summit at LATTC. Representatives from all nine colleges joined in workshops about access to education and relevant curriculum development for transgender students. The event was opened by LACCD Board of Trustees President Sydney Kamlager-Dove talking about the responsibility we all have to make our campuses and programs welcoming to all interested students. Workshops included role-playing about the stigma some students face on campuses.

An article in California Apparel News featured Tadashi Shoji as one of the most famous fashion designers for "Red Carpet" evening dresses. He attended LA Trade Tech back in the 1970s and his alma mater is always mentioned when a story is focused on his work. Most recently, California Apparel News focused on his Spring collection during New York Fashion Week, noting:

"Elegance was on the runway at the Tadashi Shoji runway show held Feb. 8 at New York Fashion Week. The Los Angeles designer, who studied at Los Angeles Trade-Technical College, has carved out a well-known niche in the eveningwear category with many of his dresses being seen on the red carpet at various entertainment award ceremonies across the country."

Los Angeles Valley College

- Los Angeles Valley College's Family Resource Center partnership was nominated for the Bellweather Award. Although it did not win the national award, congratulations to LAVC for placing in the Top 10 in the "Workforce Development" category. - Los Angeles Valley College earned the 2017 Tree Campus USA Recognition for the seventh year in a row. The Tree Campus USA program honors colleges and universities and their leaders for promoting healthy trees and engaging students and staff in the spirit of conservation. To obtain this distinction, Los Angeles Valley College met five core standards for sustainable campus forestry required by Tree Campus USA, including establishment of a tree advisory committee; evidence of a campus tree-care plan; dedicated annual expenditures for its campus tree program; an Arbor Day observance and the sponsorship of student service-learning projects. LAVC is proud of this sustained commitment to environmental stewardship.
- The Los Angeles Valley College Foundation scheduled its first-ever wine tasting fundraiser on February 23 at the home of college patron Waltona Manion. At this event, LAVC College President Dr. Erika Endrijonas announced that LAVC became the 200th college, university or conservatory as an All-Steinway School! Proceeds from the wine tasting support the Foundation's launch of the Steinway Piano Campaign.

West Los Angeles College

- Both WLAC Men's and Women's basketball teams defeated College of the Canyons at their last game on Saturday, February 17, winning the Western State Conference South Championship. Head Coaches for both teams, Anthony Jones (men's) and Twan Herron (women's), were awarded Coach of the Year. A "Thank You" recognition event for the teams and their coaches will be held in the next few weeks.
- Year Up Los Angeles held its Class Two Graduation on February 13, recognizing 30 participants who are also students at WLAC. This program, the only one of its kind in Southern California, is a one-year, intensive training program that provides low-income young adults, ages 18-24, a combination of hands-on skills development, college-level coursework and corporate internships. At the ceremony, Dr. Allison Tom-Miura, WLAC Dean of Adult and Continuing Education, was recognized with the "Year Up Champion Award" given to partners "whose investments of time and resources have

significantly contributed to both the present and future success of Year Up." Dr. Tom-Miura was able to schedule multiple noncredit courses that match Year Up's soft skills, leadership and job/employment readiness training that resulted in Year Up students earning three noncredit certificates.

- On February 9, WLAC hosted its Spring Leadership Summit with a special focus on Creative Leadership. Organized by the Creative Studies Lab

 —the only such center devoted to creativity on any US community college campus

 —the summit was attended by about 70 people. Keynote address was delivered by Len Dickter, Chair of the Culver City Cultural Affairs Commission, which spearheaded the City's recent Creative Economy Report.
- Thanks to WLAC Adult and Continuing Education Division, 45 residents from the Mar Vista Gardens (MVG) Housing project (City of LA Housing Authority) were oriented and enrolled at West and are beginning their noncredit ESL class at the MVG community center in February.
- On February 27, WLAC hosted the LAUSD District West Division's counselors for a training and orientation day to strengthen our partnership.
