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I. District Updates

First week of classes at all nine colleges began August 26, with more than 100,000 students, faculty and staff who swelled classrooms and other campus facilities. The semester began just days after the colleges held Opening Day/Flex Day sessions for all faculty and staff.

To support the rollout of AB 705 and provision of additional academic supports, **online** "academic tune-ups" are now available for free to all LACCD students with NetTutor. The new online service began with the start of the Fall Semester on Aug. 26. All faculty and staff were given information and marketing materials, including a copy of the news release, to help encourage students to take advantage of this value-added learning opportunity as part of their student experience at the nine colleges.

The District welcomes dozens of new classified staff and managers, along with over 80 new, tenure-track faculty and our new college presidents—Dr. Barry Gribbons, L.A. Valley College, and Dr. Alexis S. Montevirgen, L.A. Pierce College; and Interim Presidents Dr. Raul Rodriguez, East L.A. College, and Dr. Andrew Jones, L.A. Trade Technical College, and Workforce and Resource Development Interim Vice Chancellor Larry Frank. Executive searches will begin this fall for the next permanent presidents at East and Trade,

California Governor Gavin Newsom visited with members of the District's Board of Trustees, the Chancellor, some of our College Presidents, and with dozens of students

from LACCD's nine colleges during a special stop at East Los Angeles College (ELAC) on Aug. 29. Gov. Newsom picked ELAC in celebration of the college's diversity to make a special public announcement that the statewide, free tuition program, the California Promise, known locally as the <u>L.A. College Promise</u>, has officially expanded to two full years of tuition-free education at all California community colleges.

More than two dozen television, radio, print and online news sources covered the event, including this feature report on ELAC student Jocelyn Campos.

A press conference and roundtable discussion on food insecurity by Congressman Adam Schiff and community college leaders throughout Los Angeles County is planned for Thursday, Sept. 5 at Los Angeles City College. Board President Andra Hoffman, Chancellor Rodriguez, and L.A. City College President Dr. Mary Gallagher will be there along with college officials from Compton, Glendale, Santa Monica and Pasadena to share information about local efforts to combat student hunger and housing issues. Congressman Schiff will provide an update on his pending Food for Thought Act legislation introduced earlier this year and several students will be there to share their real stories about hunger.

The District and Board President Andra Hoffman hosted the first Women's Empowerment Conference August 15-16 for SEIU Local 99 members. Interim Deputy Chancellor Melinda Nish, Human Resources Vice Chancellor Alberto Roman, and about 100 people attended sessions with an emphasis on diversity, inclusion, gender bias and other topics.

The Chancellor's Advisory Committee for LGBTQ Affairs, chaired by LACCD Trustee David Vela, will meet from 2-4 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 24, at District Headquarters, 770 Wilshire Blvd. On the agenda will be drafting an "LACCD LGBTQ Bill of Rights" resolution that would go before the full Board for consideration and adoption in October.

The *District Quarterly* newsletter has entered its second year with the Fall 2019 issue published this month. The newsletter is transitioning to an email-based publication to increase circulation to all faculty and staff.

II. Update on the LACCD Enrollment

Enrollment and SCFF Update

1. Districtwide Daily Enrollment Comparison: Fall

Based on Day 2 in Fall 2019 (08/28/2019) and Fall 2018 (08/29/2018):

- Credit Headcount is 2% lower
- Credit Duplicated Enrollment is unchanged
- Credit Section Count is 2% lower
- Enrollment per Section 2% higher
- Instructional hours are 3% lower

Public service academies have been removed from the report to more accurately reflect core enrollment in the District.

2. AB 705: Math and English Enrollments

- As of Day 2 (8/28/19 vs 8/29/18), comparing Fall 2019 to Fall 2018, enrollments in English are 0.8% higher and 16.5% lower in math/statistics
- Enrollment increase of 7,039 in transfer level English and 7,830 in transfer level math/statistics
- Enrollment increase of 5,979 in statistics
- Colleges are actively implementing plans in to support students in the areas of Tutoring, Curriculum Development, Professional Development, and K-12 Partnerships/Summer Bridge
- EPIE will be monitoring AB705 implementation on student outcomes through reports and analyses which will initially focus on the following areas:
 - Student drop patterns in all English and Math classes; analysis will include comparisons to course and discipline enrollments in previous semesters
 - End of term analysis on course completion and throughput for Math and English
 - Conducting student surveys for Math and English students to determine barriers and successful support interventions
 - Track use the various tutoring models and analyze impact on student completion in English and Math

III. Reports from the College Presidents (based on the District Strategic Plan 2018-2023)

Goal 1: Access to Educational Opportunities

- Los Angeles Pierce College LACCD Trustee Gabriel Buelna, Ph.D., recently
 toured Pierce's Dream Resource Center (DRC) which is scheduled to open on
 September 26. The DRC will be a safe space that supports and empowers
 undocumented students in achieving their academic and personal aspirations with a
 variety of resources and services, include scholarship and financial aid information,
 one-on-one support meetings, Dream Act application assistance, AB540 residency
 support, peer mentoring and educational workshops.
- Los Angeles Southwest College The college celebrated the opening of its new School of Science on schedule with the start of the fall semester. The School of Science is a 27,000-square-foot, two-story building that took about 17 months to complete. Students now have access to a beautiful new build to learn geology, microbiology, physics and other general science classes.

- Los Angeles Valley College The LAVC Foundation held its annual Scholarship
 Awards Ceremony for scholarship recipients and donors of the named scholarships
 on August 20 in LAVC's Monarch Hall. The Foundation awarded \$173,000 in
 scholarships to 311 students in the 2018-2019 fiscal year.
- West Los Angeles College The Promise Program at WLAC has grown 200% since its launch and has a fall cohort of approximately 420 students. Dual enrollment for Spring Semester 2019 increased from 955 in 2018 to 2,089 in Spring 2019.
- West Los Angeles College The WLAC-LMU Business Scholars program, launching this Fall, has an initial cohort of 16 students. These students will have access to LMU activities, resources and counseling while still at WLAC. Successful completers are guaranteed admission to LMU.
- West Los Angeles College The College and Career Preparation Division is launching this semester its new Facilities Management program in partnership with the International Facilities Management Association, its Conservation Education and Field Experience program with the Audubon Society, and noncredit online classes to support student success with WLAC's high school partners.
- Los Angeles Harbor College The new 2019-2020 Puente Cohort is now in place. A total of about 30 students participated in the Welcome and Orientation. Currently a waiting list has been established. The Puente Club will also start this Fall.
- Los Angeles City College The college installed color-coded pathways on the floors of the Student Services Building to help lead students where they need to go.
- Los Angeles City College For two weeks, August 12 26, the college's Student Services Offices extended hours and provided additional staff to assist students.
- Los Angeles City College College officials on August 24 participated in a community "Back 2 School 2" event to provide information on G.E.D. classes.

• Los Angeles Trade-Technical College - The college's Design and Media Arts Pathway Program has won a national, First Place Award of Excellence from the National Career Pathways Network (NCPN). - East Los Angeles College Equality Day Celebration was held August 27 to celebrate diversity. Women and gender studies professor Barbara Dunsheath gave a presentation on the importance of equality and how diversity helps to shape campus life.
- Los Angeles Harbor College Harbor's Student Services Division hosted orientations for a variety of programs offices during Zero Week prior to the beginning of the fall semester. About 400 students attended, culminating with "Harbor Palooza" where students were fed and enjoyed a fun afternoon with games and music.
- Los Angeles Mission College The college hosted its annual Fall Kickoff event in August, with more than 150 new students in attendance. Students met with faculty, staff and administrators, explored the college's Career Academic Pathways, and toured the campus to learn how to access important student resources.
- Los Angeles Pierce College Nearly 750 new students attended the two-day "GO Days: Get Onboard! Get Organized! Get Oriented!" Participants took campus tours, met faculty and staff, explored majors and received information about campus services and events.
- Los Angeles Southwest College More than 800 people attended the college's biannual, one-stop registration event "Southwest Daze" on August 21. The event assisted continuing and new students to prepare for the current academic year. http://www.lasc.edu/daze
- Los Angeles Southwest College The college's Dream Resource Center, in collaboration with Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights, will soon be providing free immigration legal consultations.  wellness
- Los Angeles Valley College LAVC held its Welcome Week on August 26-29, which featured a variety of activities to help students acclimate to campus life and give them resources to help them be successful in college. Highlights included a Student Panel for New Students, a Fall 2019 Kick Off to welcome new and current students, and ASU Club Day and Campus Resource Fair.
- West Los Angeles College More than 1,600 unique visitors came to the landing page for WLAC's Open House held on Saturday, August 17. WLAC received 280 RSVPs yielding approximately 170 prospective and newly applied students and their families. Approximately 60 students attended the "For Freshmen" orientation, with many staying for the session to sign-up for the L.A. College Promise. Another 50 students attended the "For Working Adults" orientation; about 50 students started or completed their FAFSA application and 20 received assistance completing the

- online application or registering for classes. Many families attended with high school seniors to scout WLAC for future attendance and/or to investigate dual enrollment.
- Los Angeles Valley College The LAVC Academic Resource Center is offering a series of writing workshops for students during the Spring 2019 semester. These workshops focus on specific reading and writing topics that students typically struggle with. Students who attend 10 workshops in the semester will receive a certificate and can receive attendance credit for EOP and/or CalWORKs.
- Los Angeles Mission College The college hosted a grand opening of its new Student Success Center during Welcome Week, the first week of the fall semester. The entire campus community was invited to learn about the programs and services available in one central hub, including ASO, Career Center, Food Pantry, Dream Center, EOPS, International Students, METAS, L.A.
