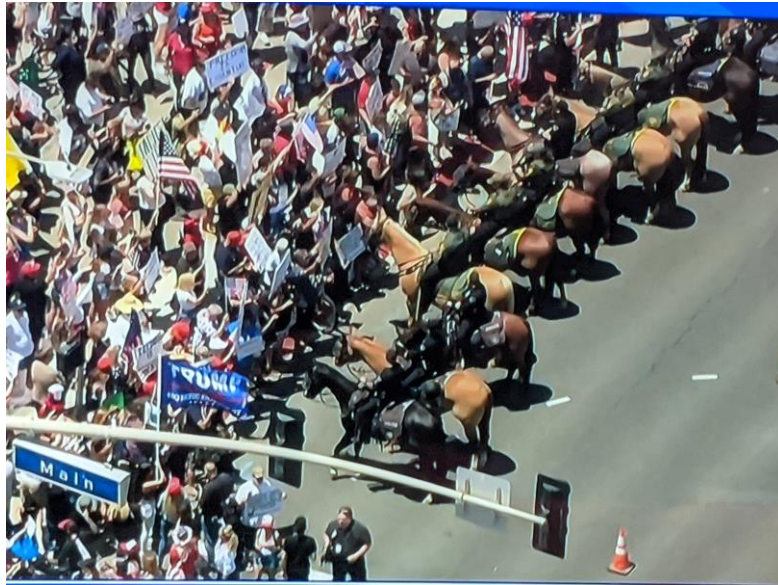

County Public Health announced May 3 that COVID-19 cases are at 25,662 positive tests and 1,229 deaths, continuing an upward trajectory. Three days earlier, on April 30, the Health Dept. announced Los Angeles County has 23,182 positive COVID-19 cases and 1,111 deaths.</p>



FACILITIES	<p>LACCD and Los Angeles City College won the award titled Walk the Walk, from the LA Better Buildings Challenge (LABBC) for our energy conservation. LABBC held its 6th Annual Innovation Awards this week (see the link below for additional information).</p> <p>The LA Better Buildings Challenge is a network of LA’s Best Buildings, working to enhance the sustainability, resilience, and economic vitality of the City and County.</p> <p><a href="https://www.la-bbc.com/events-calendar/6th-annual-innovation-awards">https://www.la-bbc.com/events-calendar/6th-annual-innovation-awards</a></p> <p>During the three-month competition in 2019, 11 participating teams of LACC students, faculty and staff saved a measured 105,795 kWh of electricity, generated \$15,509 in cost savings, and achieved a greenhouse gas emissions reduction equivalent to 13 homes’ electricity use every year. Over the course of the 10-month Energy Blitz Initiative, LACC engaged an estimated 800 LACC students, faculty and staff, and saved 1,018,985 kWh, representing an 11.7% drop in consumption, or the equivalent of an entire month’s electricity consumption for the campus.</p>

## **Governor Newsom PowerPoint & Notes from Briefing with Dr. Sonia Angell, April 28, 2020**

Both Gov. Newsom and State Health Dept. Director Sonia Angell described today's briefing with "cautious optimism" and provided an outline for getting California from Stage 1 to Stage 2, "within weeks" not months—assuming the conditions are right and the trends in stabilization for COVID-19 hospitalization cases remain as shown in slide 2.

More than 3 million masks arrived over the weekend, with 2.87 million immediately distributed to healthcare sites in state.

Gov. talked about possibly opening the Fall school term early for K-12 to compensate for the learning loss from now thru summer.

Both emphasized that going into Stage 2 depends greatly on expanded testing, ability to track and isolate cases and continued use of strong social distancing. Schools and classrooms will be significantly changes and modified for social distancing and learning.

Slides 8 and 9 show steps and process to go into Stage 2. Slide 10 references ability of local counties and cities to have ability to regional variations—while slide references counties ability to relax rules sooner, Gov. also referenced San Francisco as extending Safer at Home through the end of May.

Both emphasized ability to be flexible in response, especially is situation get worse.

Stages 3 and 4 are months away from happening.

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## 6 Indicators for Modifying Stay-at-Home Order

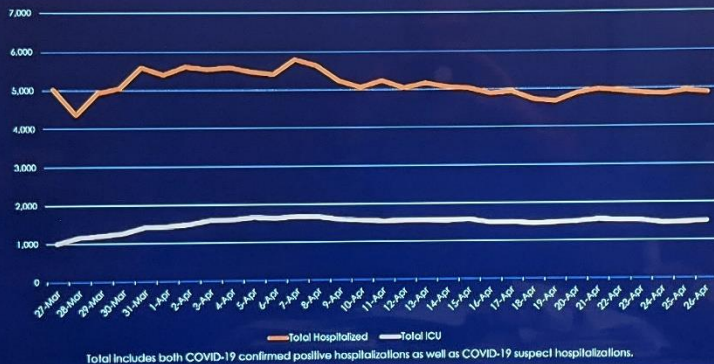
- Ability to test, contact trace, isolate, and support the exposed
- Ability to protect those at high risk for COVID-19
- Surge capacity for hospital and health systems
- Therapeutic development to meet the demand
- Ability of businesses, schools, and childcare facilities to support physical distancing
- Determination of when to reinstitute measures like Stay-At-Home

Making essential workforce environment as safe as possible.	Creating opportunities for lower risk sectors to adapt and re-open.  Modified school programs and childcare re-open.	Creating opportunities for higher risk sectors to adapt and re-open.	Return to expanded workforce in highest risk workplaces.  Requires Therapeutics.

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## Stage 1: Safety and Preparedness

**This is where we are now.**

- **Continue to build out testing, contact tracing, PPE, and hospital surge capacity.**
- **Continue to make essential workplaces as safe as possible.**
  - Physical and work flow adaption
  - Essential workforce safety net
  - Make PPE more widely available
  - Individual behavior changes
- **Prepare sector-by-sector safety guidelines for expanded workforce.**

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## Stage 2: Lower Risk Workplaces

**Gradually opening some lower risk workplaces with ADAPTATIONS:**

- Retail (e.g. curbside pickup)
- Manufacturing
- Offices (when telework not possible)
- Opening more public spaces

**Expanded Workforce Safety Net:**

- Wage replacement so workers can stay home when sick

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## Stage 2: Lower Risk Workplaces

### Schools and Childcare Facilities with Adaptations:

- Summer programs and next school year potentially starting sooner (July/August)
- Childcare facilities to provide more care
- Address learning gaps
- Ensure students and staff are protected
- Allow broader workforce to return to work

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## Actions needed to get from Stage 1 to Stage 2



### Government Actions

- Policies that allow people to stay home when they're sick
- Guidance provided on how to reduce risk



### Business Actions

- Wage replacement so workers can stay home when sick
- Implement adaptations to lower-risk workplaces NOW
- Employees continue to work from home when possible



### Individual Actions

- Safety precautions – physical distancing, face coverings, etc.
- Avoid all non-essential travel
- Support and care for people who are at high risk

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## When are we ready for Stage 2?

**Key indicator considerations to move to Stage 2:**

- Hospitalization and ICU trends stable.
- Hospital surge capacity to meet demand.
- Sufficient PPE supply to meet demand.
- Sufficient testing capacity to meet demand.
- Contact tracing capacity statewide.

**Transition to Stage 2 will occur through a statewide modification to the Stay-At-Home Order.**

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## Opportunity for Regional Variations

During Stage 2, counties may choose to relax stricter local orders at their own pace.

Following Stage 2, once a statewide COVID-19 surveillance system is made possible through testing, further regional variations could be supported.

State will consult and collaborate closely with local governments.



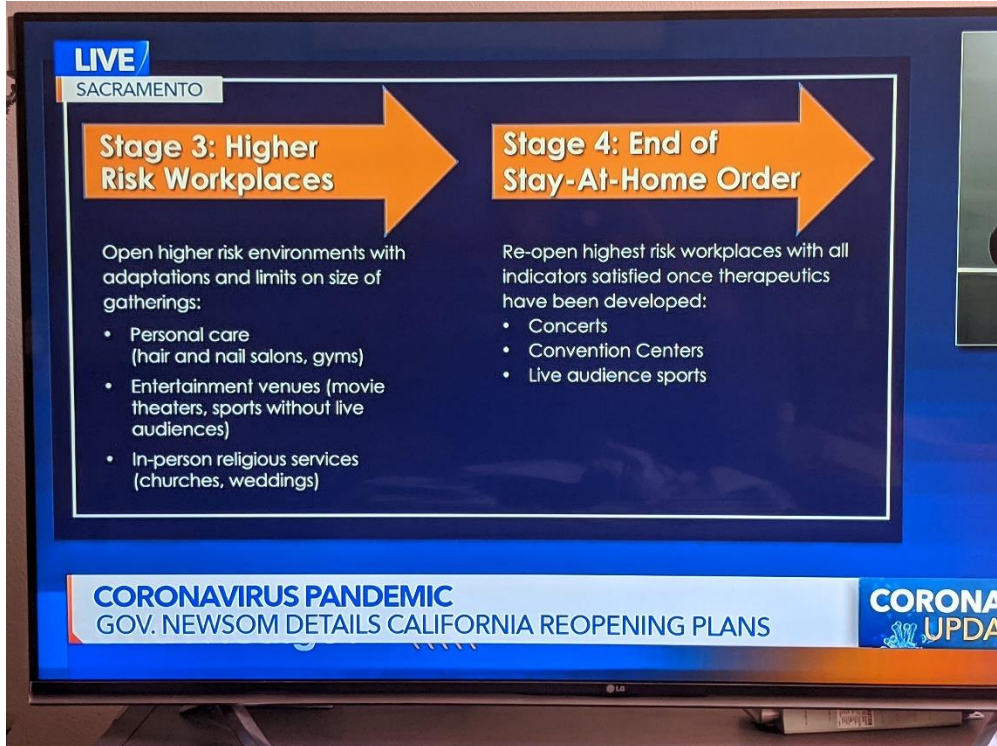

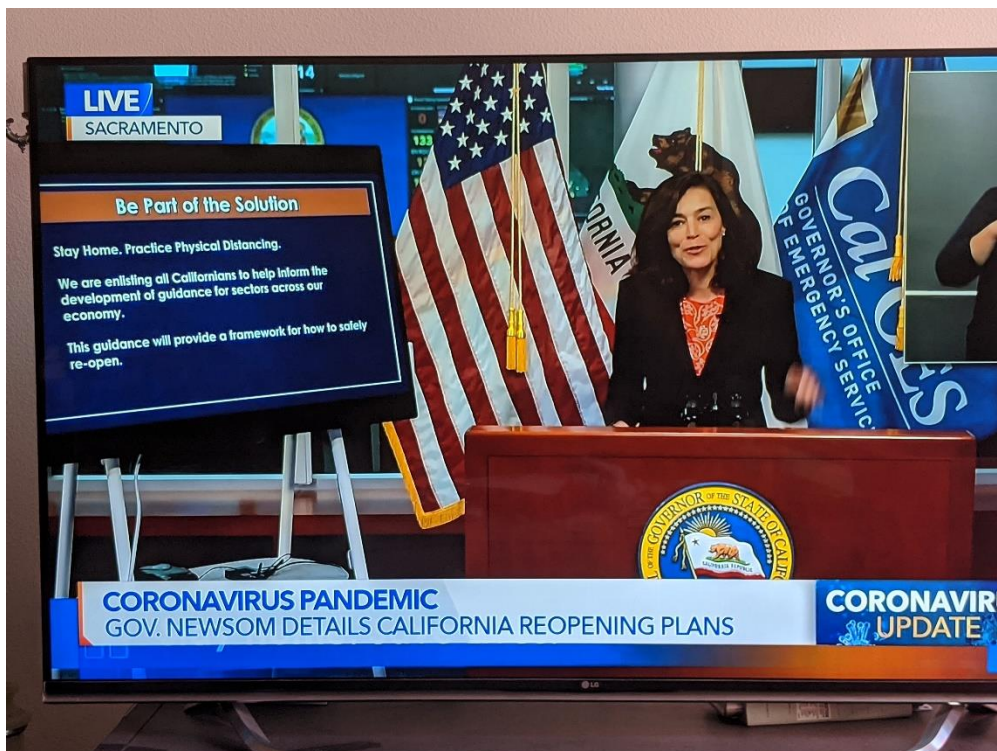
