


Dear LACCD Community,

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ELAC Student Prisma Santiago Named 2025 Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholar

ELAC is proud to announce that Biology major Prisma Santiago has been named a 2025 Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholar. Santiago is one of only 90 recipients selected nationwide from a competitive pool of more than 1,600 applicants, and the sole recipient from ELAC this year.

The prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship provides up to \$55,000 per year for up to three years to complete a bachelor's degree at an accredited four-year undergraduate institution in the United States. This transformative scholarship serves as last-dollar funding after all institutional aid, significantly easing the financial burden of completing a bachelor's degree.

"We are immensely proud of Prisma's achievement in earning this prestigious national scholarship," said Dr. Monte E. Perez, Interim President of East Los Angeles College. "Her selection as a Jack Kent Cooke Scholar is a testament to her academic excellence, leadership abilities, and dedication to her educational journey. Prisma represents the exceptional talent and determination present throughout our student body."

Santiago, an active participant in both the college's Honors Program and Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS), also serves as Vice President of the Chicanos for Community Medicine club. The Honors Program at ELAC offers priority consideration for admission to prestigious universities, including UCLA, UC Riverside, UC Irvine, and several other notable institutions.

"This scholarship represents a life-changing opportunity that will help me pursue my academic dreams without the burden of financial stress," said Prisma. "I'm grateful to my professors, counselors, and the supportive community at ELAC who have guided me on this journey."

VPAM and ELAC to Showcase Innovative STEAM Project "We Place Life at the Center" at 2025 AAMG Conference

ELAC and the Vincent Price Art Museum (VPAM) have been selected to present the innovative exhibition "We Place Life at the Center / Situamos la vida en el centro" at the 2025 Association of Academic Museums and Galleries (AAMG) Conference. Curator Joseph Valencia and Anthropology Professor Christine Sepulveda will serve as featured panelists at the conference, themed "Belonging: Storytelling Across Campus and Community," taking place June 24-27, 2025, at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque.

The presentation will showcase their interdisciplinary collaboration that bridges art, science, and environmental justice. Valencia and Sepulveda co-taught an innovative course that directly connected classroom learning with exhibition development, demonstrating how academic museums can serve as educational laboratories where students engage with urgent global challenges like climate change.

A highlight of their collaboration was a field research trip to the Xochimilco wetlands in Mexico City, where students engaged with local environmental leaders and artists to understand Indigenous approaches to environmental stewardship. This transformative experience empowered students to develop public programs and create a mural that translates complex scientific concepts into accessible community art.

Students actively contributed to the exhibition by designing programs and creating visual art that became integral to the museum experience, providing professional development opportunities while enriching the exhibition with diverse perspectives.

"We Place Life at the Center" stems from the work of Los Angeles-based Colombian artist Carolina Caycedo and represents four years of research across the United States, Latin America, and the Caribbean. The exhibition promotes alternative solutions to climate crises rooted in ecofeminist and environmental justice perspectives, featuring 35 artworks by Caycedo alongside 30 works from artists and environmental movements within her network.

The exhibition closed at VPAM in March 2025 and opened at the Museo de Arte Miguel Urrutia in Bogotá, Colombia, where it remains on view through July 21, 2025.

The event was a resounding success and highlights Mission College's ongoing high school outreach efforts to grow its College Promise student population.




Pacoima Open House Opens Doors to Accessible Education

On Saturday, May 17, LAMC hosted an open house at its Pacoima site, welcoming more than 100 community members and prospective students. The event introduced attendees to the free educational opportunities and support services available at the college's Pacoima location.

Attendees learned about noncredit course offerings and certificate programs, including ESL, GED Preparation, Computer Basics, Civics/Citizenship, and Allied Health certificates such as In-Home Health Services, EKG Technician, and the new Community Health Worker program. They also had the opportunity to connect with Student Services, including DSPS, the Dream Resource Center, Basic Needs, and Admissions & Records.

In addition to bilingual and Spanish presentations, on-site registration and enrollment assistance were available, allowing students to begin enrolling in tuition-free summer and fall classes. The strong turnout and engagement reflect the growing interest in the Pacoima site and the vital role it plays in serving local adult learners and families.





Pierce College Students Win Top Honors at Statewide AGS Convention

Three students from Los Angeles Pierce College's Pi Chapter of Alpha Gamma Sigma (AGS) earned prestigious statewide scholarships during the 99th Annual AGS Spring Convention in Ontario, California, confirming the talent and dedication of Pierce students.

Ethan Nasseri and Ava Kim were each awarded the Kathleen D. Loly Scholarship for their academic excellence. Noor Kalla received the distinguished Ed Walsh Scholarship in recognition of his leadership and service.

Their achievements were among only 37 scholarships awarded statewide this year, totaling \$42,750.

The Pierce delegation also brought home a series of spirited awards, including honors for best depiction of the convention theme, most humorous t-shirt design, and most outrageous name tags. The Pi

Chapter was recognized by the California Community Colleges Board of Trustees for its impactful service with the Brahma Bodega, which combats student food insecurity on campus.

Credit for the chapter's success is shared with a devoted group of faculty advisors—Carman Wimsatt, Lisa Valdez, and Kaycea Campbell—whose mentorship continues to empower student leaders. Additional support from Pierce's Associated Student Organization, the Office of Student Engagement, and college staff illustrates the collaboration that supports student achievement.

Three Brahmas En route to Paris!

The French section of the Modern Languages Department is delighted to announce that Regina Valenzuela Salazar, Adamary Cantillano, and DaSha Hester-Olivarez have been selected by the Dennis and Anne Beaver Foundation to pursue their study of French in Paris this July. The scholarship will cover airfare, four weeks of courses, accommodation with a French family, and various touristic excursions, such as to Provins (a medieval city), Giverny (Claude Monet's gardens), and a weekend in Alsace, as well as visits to the Louvre, Orsay, Notre-Dame (newly restored), and a night at the Opera (the ballet *The Sleeping Beauty*).

Regina Valenzuela Salazar is a second-year English major. She took French 1 and French 2 at LAPC and is planning to get a minor in French to expand her knowledge of French culture and literature. She enjoys reading and writing, and her biggest inspirations are Bob Dylan and J.D. Salinger. Currently, she is the coeditor of the fiction board for Directions, LAPC's own literary magazine.





Adamary Cantillano is a sophomore and English Literature major who will transfer to UCLA next fall. She's discovered her passion for the humanities, and more specifically in the literature and language of cultures, during her two years at LAPC. She was born into a purely Spanish-speaking family, and English is her second language. Becoming bilingual has helped her be proficient in different aspects of her life and fed an interest in learning more languages; at the top of her list was French because her favorite philosophers are French. As Adamary said, "mastering and learning French was my first glimpse into a deeper understanding of world literature, and now that I've gotten the opportunity to go abroad for it, my understanding of French culture and art will be even wider, further enriching my passion and love for the humanities."

DaSha Hester-Olivarez has taken French 3 and 4 and is currently taking French 10 at Pierce College. She will be obtaining an AA in French at LACC as well as a degree in engineering with the aspiration of becoming an astronautical engineer. 
Pierce College was represented by Savanah Senn (Plant Science), Travis Orloff (Chair of Physics), and Wiley Brown (Grants Coordinator). The event focused on integrating research experiences into science

curricula and emphasized skill development in data analysis, the scientific method, and industry collaboration.

"The workshop emphasized practical applications of scientific research and highlighted ways to expand access to hands-on learning," Senn said.

As part of ongoing efforts at Pierce College, students in the PLNT SC 103 Soils course are currently examining eco-friendly alternatives to plastic row covers, an example of how faculty are incorporating applied research into coursework.

Participation in the workshop supports goals outlined in Pierce College's Strategic Master Plan, including enhancing student learning outcomes and expanding industry partnerships.

Four JKC Scholars In Four Years

Once again, a student from West Los Angeles College (WLAC) has been selected for the highly competitive Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship. This prestigious award provides up to \$55,000 per year to help high-achieving students complete their bachelor's degrees with minimal debt.

This year's recipient is Charles "Spenser" Wilson, one of just 90 students chosen from a pool of more than 1,600 applicants representing 212 community colleges across 43 states. Wilson is also a member of WLAC's Transfer Honors Program and becomes the fourth student from the program to earn the Cooke Scholarship in the past four years. Two students were awarded in 2024, and another in 2022.

Wilson's path to college was far from traditional. He left high school during his junior year, earned a GED, and worked full-time at a music shop. Initially pursuing a career in audio engineering, he later discovered a passion for healthcare and completed EMT and Phlebotomy training through UCLA's Center for Prehospital Care. In 2022, he enrolled at West to complete general education and prenursing coursework. His next step is UCLA, where he will pursue a Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

"I always felt like an outcast, and that is the opposite of my experience at West," Wilson shared. "The quality of the professors and coursework I've had, along with the study habits I've developed, make me feel more than ready to succeed at UCLA."

LAUSD Foster Youth Event

In collaboration with WLAC Foster Youth Programs, Climate Center, and Career Center, LAUSD hosted its end-of-the-year Foster Youth Celebration on the WLAC campus. The event recognized all graduating seniors who identify as foster and featured a guest speaker, a scholarship awards ceremony, and a job and resource fair. A number of students in attendance were awarded summer internships with the campus Climate Center, and others were invited to participate in the Climate Center's Fall Fellowship program once they enroll as WLAC students.



15th Annual Poster Showcase & Film Festival

Student knowledge and creativity were on display at the 15th Annual WLAC Poster Showcase held over the course of a week in May. More than 80 students presented academic posters on a wide range of topics from scurvy prevention and dental health to the

historically narrow definitions of female beauty in America. Faculty judges reviewed the entries and selected winners, who were awarded certificates and gift cards.

This year's event also featured a new addition: a 90-minute screening of student-made short films, most of which were submitted by WLAC's Film / TV Production students. Adding a touch of Hollywood glamour, set-dressing students from the program transformed the Fine Arts Theater with a "red carpet treatment," complete with an actual red carpet, drapes, floral stands, and other cinematic décor.

Professor Receives Fulbright Specialist Award

Foundation Launches Initiative to Raise \$1 Million

The West Los Angeles College Foundation has launched an initiative to raise \$1 million in planned gifts by June 30, 2026. An anonymous donor has already seeded the campaign with a planned gift of \$750,000.

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


LACCD Enrollment Update

SUMMER 2025 TO SUMMER 2024 COMPARISONS

Summer 2025 Enrollment Update:

Comparing Summer 2025 to Summer 2024 as day -14 of the semester, student credit headcount is up by 18% and enrollment is up by 20% Districtwide. Class offerings have increased slightly by 3%, while enrollment per section has increased by 17%. Growth was seen across all age groups, with increases of 11% among students ages 20–24, 14% among those ages 25–34 and 35–54, and 33% among students aged 55 and older. The most substantial growth is among students under age 20, with a 30% increase in headcount. Enrollment has grown across gender lines, with both male and female student populations increasing by 18%. In addition, gains are observed across nearly all racial and ethnic groups, including Asian (+21%), Black (+23%), Filipino (+21%), Hispanic (+22%), Multiethnic (+27%), and White (+4%)

students. Compared to Spring 2024, noncredit enrollment has also grown, with headcount rising by 9% (from 7,860 to 8,587) and total enrollment increasing by 13% (from 11,205 to 12,701). In terms of course modality, 66% of classes are offered remotely, 26% in person, and 8% in a hybrid format. Remote classes have the highest fill rate (80%), followed by hybrid (58%) and in-person classes (54%).
