Commencement at West

Over 3,000 family members and friends gathered to celebrate nearly 600 students, including two WLAC employees, participating in the 57th Commencement ceremony at West Los Angeles College. This year's graduating class included 1,765 students who collectively earned 3,700 certificates, associate degrees and 58 bachelor's degrees. First-generation students were 39% of the graduates.

In his remarks, College President Dr. James M. Limbaugh highlighted two graduates who, he said, "illustrate the power of a transformative education."

The first was class valedictorian Charles Spenser Wilson, who left high school before earning his diploma. Wilson shared that, based on his family history, statistics might have predicted a future of drug addiction or an early death. Instead, he was selected from over 1,700 applicants to receive the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Transfer Scholarship, which will assist him in obtaining a bachelor's degree in nursing at UCLA.

Olivia Kim, a dual-enrollment student, was the second person. Kim began high school as a straight A student, but six months into her freshman year, her father died and she did not pass most of her classes. Realizing that her father would want her to succeed, Olivia began enrolling in courses at West to make up her failed high school classes. This semester she took 12 units at West and a full schedule at her high school, graduating high school as class valedictorian and earning her AA degree from West LA College in the same week.



Over 100 Students in Paid Summer Internships

In its second year of offering paid summer internships, the Center for Climate Change Education at West has doubled the size of the student cohort to 106 students. Under the banner of "Every Career is a

Climate Career,” these students of various majors from multiple LACCD colleges are placed at 49 blue and green job host sites throughout Southern California.



Highlights from Career Training Education

- West has received a \$800,000 K-16 collaborative grant to help high school students complete CTE programs, transition to college, and access work-based learning opportunities.
- Aviation Tech celebrated 73 graduates, including 14-year-old Golan Cabrales-Goldstein, who completed a certificate in Aircraft Power Plant Technician. He plans to return to West to complete his Associate Degree in the Fall. On the other end of the spectrum was Elizabeth Gomez Campos, a full-time employee at American Airlines and a full-time mom who earned Aircraft Power Plant Technician and Airframe Maintenance Technician certificates.
- The newly launched EMT program celebrated 25 graduates with most coming from the POPP program. Due to its popularity with POPP students, the EMT program will also be offered at the POPP off-campus facility starting in the Fall.



Student Accepted Into Artificial Intelligence & Semiconductor Program

WLAC student Sequin Thomas was accepted into an Artificial Intelligence and Semiconductor Chips Summer Program run by the University of Southern California (USC) Institute for Technology Enabled High Education. This was made possible by the Reinventing Geospatial, Inc. (RGI) scholarship he received from the United States Geospatial Intelligence Foundation (USGIF). The USGIF scholarship program aims to support and encourage talented individuals who demonstrate a passion for geospatial intelligence, geospatial sciences, and related disciplines.

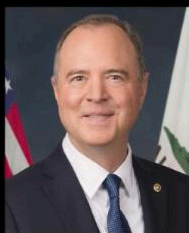
LATTC Celebrates 100th Anniversary Commencement

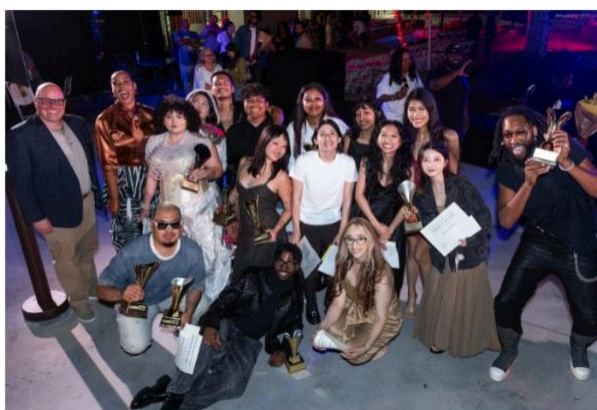

Pierce College Agricultural Education Centers Earns LACCD Prestigious Award for Excellence in Educational Facility

The Agricultural Education Center at Los Angeles Pierce College was recognized with the prestigious New Construction in Higher Education at the Annual Construction Management Association of America – Southern California Awards gala. The two-acre project site was designed to integrate indoor and outdoor learning laboratories with features that mimic a real working farm for the College's Plant Science & Horticulture program.

"LACCD is honored to be recognized by CMAA - Southern California as a leader advancing innovative and sustainable learning environments," said Kelsey K. Iino, Board of Trustee President. "Access to comprehensive, state-of-the-art learning environments is at the core of LACCD's educational mission and delivers on the promise made to the voters that have supported the \$14.9 billion bond program."

Designed by NAC Architects, it incorporated all aspects of the project site to integrate the site's landscaping and plantings into the Plant Science Program curriculum. The 120" Urbangreen Cistern and Retention tank retains up to 50,000 gallons for irrigation of the project site through a low volume drip and bubbler irrigation system, reducing the College's use of potable water. Constructed by Rudolph & Sletten, Inc, the 10,400 square foot primary classroom and lab facility features state-of-the-art equipment like an Autoclave Steam Sterilizer and under counter incubator and lab oven.

"LACCD strives to create unique spaces that maximize teaching opportunities for students," said Dr. Alberto J. Román, LACCD Chancellor. "Learning in the Agricultural Education Center extends beyond the traditional classroom with the intentional integration of the outdoor planter areas for educational observation, management of the irrigation and soil conditions. This innovative approach gives our students the access to practical skills and knowledge needed to prepare and be successful in the agricultural and farming industry."

The project included state-of-the-art two greenhouses and hothouse, enabling the College to incorporate a different assortment of seasonal fruits and vegetables. The aluminum structure is fitted with the louvre system to teach students how to optimize the environment for the crops they are growing.

"Pierce College is proud to honor our heritage as an agricultural college. The Agricultural Education Center expanded our ability to prepare students with today's farming techniques and the diversity of plants," said Aracely Aguiar, Los Angeles Pierce College President. "The greenhouses seamlessly integrate advanced sensor technologies into the learning environments, providing students real-time temperature, humidity, light levels, CO2 levels, and soil moisture data as part of their academic studies."



Biotech Presentations & Certificate Ceremony

On Thursday, June 5, Los Angeles Mission College's Biotechnology students presented their original research projects at the annual Biotechnology Research Exhibition. This year's projects included *B.E.T. on Clean Hands: Soap vs. Sanitizer*, *Shining Light on Quantum Tunneling*, *CRISPR/Cas9: Crafting Light Beyond Earth*, and *BPA ELISA: Plastics to Plate*.

Following the presentations, the STEM Department hosted a recognition ceremony for the Spring 2025 Biotechnology cohort. The event featured keynote speaker Adel Villalobos, Founder and CEO of Lief Labs, who shared his insights and encouraged students as they prepare to enter the biotechnology workforce. All fourteen students in the cohort received job interviews or employment offers from local biotechnology partners and will continue in the program while gaining hands-on experience in the field.



50th Annual Commencement

Los Angeles Mission College held its 50th Annual Commencement on Tuesday, June 10, at 10 am. This year's ceremony featured a keynote address by former U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services Xavier Becerra, who spoke about the value of education, public service, and perseverance in the face of adversity.

Little Willie G, lead singer of Thee Midnites, joined the celebration with a special musical performance. Although not all graduates were able to attend in person, the college conferred 1,379 degrees to 829 students this year.

LAMC Academic Senate President Maryanne Galindo noted that the average age of this year's graduating class was 27—ranging from the youngest graduate at just 14 years old to the oldest, 84-year-old Carlito Salayo Dayo, [who was featured in an article published by the Los Angeles Daily News](#) (subscription may be required).

ELAC Foundation Sets Historic Record with \$212,819 in Scholarship Awards

The East Los Angeles College (ELAC) Foundation reached a historic milestone at its annual scholarship ceremony, awarding a record-breaking \$212,819 to 222 students through 49 scholarship programs. The

sold-out event at the Courtyard by Marriott Monterey Park's Crystal Ballroom drew 330 attendees and marked the highest scholarship distribution in ELAC's history.

The total award amount exceeded the previous year by \$1,219, demonstrating the Foundation's expanding commitment to educational access. This year's ceremony was the first formal sit-down dinner format in several years, creating an elevated experience for recipients and families.

"Each of these students has overcome significant challenges to reach this moment," said Dr. Monte E. Pérez, ELAC's Interim President, who delivered the keynote address. "These scholarships are more than just financial aid—they are a testament to our community's belief in the potential of every student who walks through our doors."

The evening featured appearances from Los Angeles Community College District Chancellor Dr. Alberto J. Román, who presented awards from the Javier Román Scholarship Fund, named for his late father. ELAC Foundation's newest board member, Eli Raffeld, VP and partner at Ethan Capital LLC and managing partner of the host venue, expressed his commitment to supporting the college's educational mission.

The Foundation introduced two significant new programs this year. The 50th Chicano Moratorium Committee Scholarship honors the legacy of the August 29, 1970 Chicano Moratorium, promoting student growth through academic achievement and real-world experiences.

The Abraham Sandoval Initiative Scholarship, established by ELAC Adjunct Professor Abraham Sandoval, supports students pursuing careers in real estate, business, or law who demonstrate potential for positive community impact. Professor Sandoval, a first-generation attorney and entrepreneur who founded Sandoval Law APC, created this scholarship to assist students from underserved communities in accessing legal and business education opportunities.

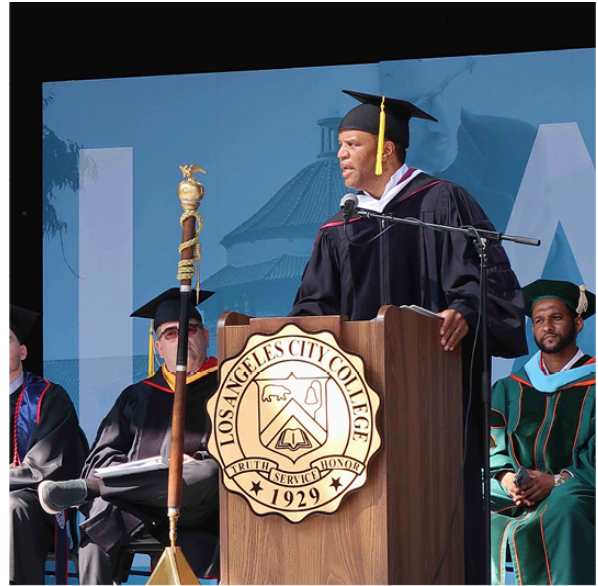
The ceremony's success was enabled by generous community sponsorship. Valedictorian Level sponsors (\$10,000) included Courtyard by Marriott Monterey Park and Children's Hospital Los Angeles. "This year's historic level of scholarship awards highlights the perseverance and excellence of our students, while reinforcing our mission to ensure higher education remains within reach for everyone."

These LA community college students are getting paid to go to school. Here's how

In November last year, Los Angeles City College student Brenda Olazava got an email notifying her that she had been selected to participate in a guaranteed income pilot program. She would receive 12 monthly stipends of \$1,000 to spend however she

wanted.

"We'll see if this is true or not," she thought.

The pilot program for the Los Angeles Community College District, Building Outstanding Opportunities for Students to Thrive, or BOOST, provides monthly payments for one year to eligible community college students majoring in a health care field. Olazava's skepticism disappeared when she received her first monthly stipend in time for Thanksgiving 2024.

BuildLACCD Construction Job Fair

On May 30, 2025, the BuildLACCD Community Economic Development (CED) team, in partnership with McCarthy Building Companies (McCarthy), hosted a targeted construction job fair at **Los Angeles Pierce College**. This event was part of a broader workforce development strategy aimed at connecting Construction, Manufacturing and Utilities (CMU) students from **Los Angeles Trade-Technical College** (LATTC) with direct employment and internship opportunities in the construction industry. McCarthy coordinated with a number of their union signatory subcontractors to provide students a wide variety of work opportunities and industry information.

Participating contractors included **McCarthy, Camblin Steel, Murray Company, Crown Fence, Southland Industries, Excel Paving, and American Landscaping**. The BuildLACCD Internship Program also participated to share information about the program and internship opportunities planned for the summer and fall. During the first hour of the job fair, students from the LATTC CMU program were given exclusive access to meet and interview with participating contractors.

Prior to the job fair, the CED team worked with the students to prepare and bring multiple copies of their resumes, portfolios, notebooks, pens, and appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE). The CED team is continuing to work with McCarthy and participating subcontractors to complete the hiring process as the opportunity becomes available for the specific trade.

McCarthy Builders is the General Contractor on the [Academic East](#) project at Los Angeles Pierce College and the [Cesar Chavez Administration](#) replacement project at Los Angeles City College.





WLAC Plant Facilities and Plant Shops Starts Construction

On June 23, 2025, LACCD celebrated the start of construction for a new **Plant Facilities and Plant Shops** at West Los Angeles College (WLAC). LACCD Board President **Kelsey Iino**, LACCD Chancellor **Alberto Román**, Vice Chancellor/ Chief Facilities Executive Leigh Sata and WLAC leadership took part in the

groundbreaking ceremony. The new 15,943 square foot LEED Silver facility will replace the existing bungalows and temporary storage area. The project is funded through the California State Capital Overlay Program, and LACCD's Measures J, CC, and LA. The project is anticipated to open in 2027.

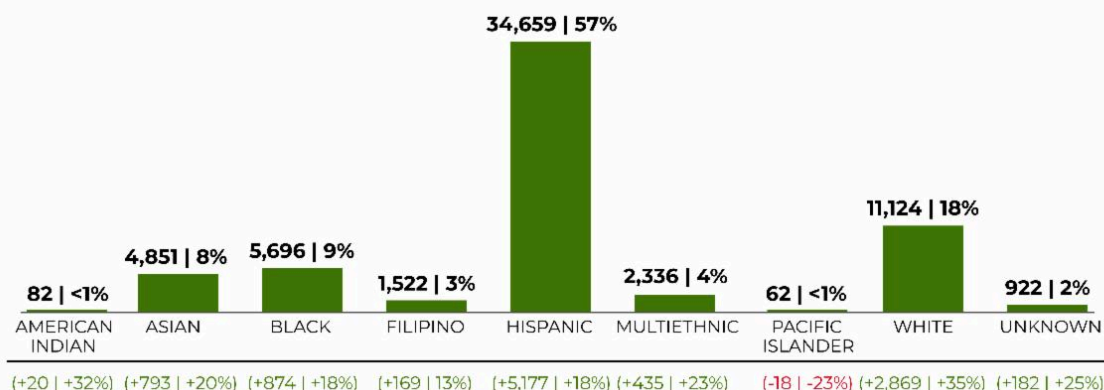

Summer 2025 Enrollment Update:

Comparing Summer 2025 to Summer 2024 as day 7 of the semester, student credit headcount is up by 21% and enrollment is up by 26% Districtwide. Class offerings have increased slightly by 3%, while enrollment per section has increased by 22%. Enrollment has grown across gender lines, with both female and male student populations increasing by 18% and 24%, respectively. Growth was also seen across all age groups, with gains of 15%-21% among students aged 20–54 and a 33% increase among those aged 55 and older. The most substantial growth is among students under age 20, with a 25% increase in headcount. In addition, gains are observed across nearly all racial and ethnic groups, including Asian (+20%), Black (+18%), Filipino (+13%), Hispanic (+18%), Multiethnic (+23%), and White (+35%) students. Compared to Summer 2024, noncredit enrollment has also grown, with a 14%

increase in headcount (from 10,798 to 12,313) and total enrollment (from 14,922 to 17,070). In terms of course modality, 70% of classes are offered remotely, 23% in person, and 7% in a hybrid format. Remote classes have the highest fill rate (88%), followed by hybrid (69%) and in-person classes (65%).
