Workshops covered topics including college admissions, financial aid, and career readiness, helping students and their families prepare for the next step in their educational journey.

The fair's success was made possible through the support of LAUSD Region North, which helped bring students and families to campus to engage with colleges and universities from across the San Fernando Valley and beyond.



Supporting Undocumented Students

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Pierce College Expands ZTC Program with New Support for Faculty and Students

Los Angeles Pierce College continues to expand its commitment to access and affordability through its growing Zero Textbook Cost (ZTC) program. With more than 300 class sections designated as ZTC



each semester, students are saving nearly \$1 million collectively on textbooks every term.

To help students take advantage of these savings, the college has launched a new campus-wide advertising campaign. Informational signs are being installed around campus and in the mall to help students recognize the ZTC symbol in the class schedule and understand how to search for these sections when registering. Faculty who are teaching ZTC courses

are encouraged to inform their department chairs so that the ZTC designation can be included in the schedule.

In addition to helping students, the college is also investing in faculty through a new paid professional development program aimed at supporting the creation of high-quality, zero-cost courses. This effort includes participation in the Peer Online Course Review (POCR) process, a statewide initiative developed by the California Virtual Campus (CVC) to improve the quality of online teaching and learning.

POCR is a structured, faculty-driven review process that evaluates online courses against a set of research-based design standards. These standards ensure that courses are accessible, easy to navigate, and designed to engage students meaningfully. Faculty participating in POCR receive detailed feedback and support as they refine their courses, improving everything from content organization to multimedia integration and alignment with student learning outcomes.

Research shows that courses aligned with POCR standards have a 10% higher student success rate than the average online course. By integrating POCR into the ZTC initiative, LAPC is reinforcing its commitment to educational equity—ensuring that free-to-students doesn't mean lower quality. Instead, it's an opportunity to improve both access and outcomes.

Faculty can participate through two levels of support: first, a \$1,000 stipend is offered for faculty to complete the POCR process on their own ZTC course. This opportunity is open not only to instructors teaching within the ZTC grant's defined pathways, but also to those teaching General Education and other supporting courses. After completing POCR, faculty can choose to take the next step and develop a MasterClass version of their course for an additional \$500 stipend. These MasterClasses serve as high-quality, accessible templates for future instructors to adapt and personalize, ensuring that course excellence is sustained even as instructors change.

These efforts support Pierce College's commitment to building a strong, sustainable foundation for teaching and learning that is affordable and offers quality education.

Pierce College Expands Credit for Prior Learning Opportunities

Pierce College is strengthening its commitment to student success by expanding opportunities for students to earn credit for what they already know. During the 2024–2025 academic year, Pierce faculty collaborated with Interim Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) Coordinator, Cristina Castelo Rodriguez, to develop nearly 70 new CPL opportunities. These include credit-by-exam, portfolio review, recognition of industry credentials and military training.

This local effort aligns with a broader statewide initiative led by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office to expand CPL access across the state by 2030. Spearheaded by the Mapping Articulated Pathways (MAP) Initiative, this movement aims to recognize and validate the diverse learning experiences of students—especially working adults, apprentices and veterans.

The 2030 vision includes building the capacity and procedures necessary to ensure that at least 250,000 Californians—including 220,000 working adults and apprentices, and 30,000 veterans—receive CPL offers and awards. The goal is to boost equitable access to college, increase degree and certificate completion and support long-term career success. The potential economic impact of this initiative is substantial: projections estimate a \$32.4 billion combined benefit over 20 years. This includes \$3.7 billion in immediate savings and preserved funds, along with \$28.8 billion in long-term economic gains.

\$100K Grant to Launch New Real Estate Appraisal Program

West has been awarded a \$100,000 grant from Wells Fargo to launch a groundbreaking real estate appraiser education program this Fall. This is a first-of-its-kind, Bureau of Real Estate Appraisers (BREA)-approved program that provides aspiring appraisers with an innovative pathway to licensure without the traditional supervisory requirement.

The new program offers a structured, classroom-based alternative to the conventional one-on-one apprenticeship model, creating greater access for students from all backgrounds. Real estate appraisal has historically faced challenges in attracting and retaining talent, in part due to reliance on hard-to-

access mentorship models. WLAC's program is among the first in California to offer an alternative, competency-based pathway to licensure, expanding opportunities for those previously shut out by traditional entry points.

"We are deeply grateful to Wells Fargo for their investment in our students and in the future of the appraisal profession," said WLAC Dean, Dr. Carmen Dones. "This grant helps us create a more inclusive and equitable pathway into an industry that is vital to fair housing, lending, and economic opportunity."

The \$100,000 grant will fund curriculum development, faculty training, student recruitment, and real-world learning experiences as WLAC prepares to welcome its first cohort of students to the groundbreaking program.

And our president, Dr. James Limbaugh, continues to show his support and trust in this staff-led implementation."

The college has further institutionalized Caring Campus by embedding its principles into the Enrollment Management Plan, ensuring that care and connection remain central to student success strategies.

"Community colleges in particular can be life-changing for students," said Michelle Long-Coffee, WLAC's Public Relations Manager. "The difference often comes down to whether students feel cared about. Caring Campus gives us the structure and accountability to ensure that care is consistent and intentional."


LACCD Strengthens Community Partnerships in the San Gabriel Valley


Everbridge mobile application Everbridge 360

Everbridge 360 carries forward the existing virtual tools (personal safety plans, college maps, Title IX resources, Sheriff's contact numbers, etc.) and adds direct phone numbers for each college president's office, supporting compliance with SB98 (SAFE Act) procedures.

The Everbridge 360 mobile app is the official platform for receiving LACCD Safety Alerts directly on your phone. It replaces the older Everbridge app.

With Everbridge 360, you'll have access to:

- Real-time emergency notifications
- College maps
- Personal safety plans and emergency procedures
- Anonymous incident reporting and Title IX reporting
- Mental health resources



LACCD Enrollment update



Fall 2025 Enrollment Update:

Comparing Fall 2025 to Fall 2024 as Day 28 of the semester, student credit headcount is up 8% and enrollment is up 6% Districtwide. Class offerings decreased slightly by 1%, while enrollment per section rose by 7%. Enrollment has grown across gender categories, with both female and male student populations increasing by 8% and 9%, respectively. Growth across all age categories was also observed, with the largest gains of 16%-17% among students who are 35 years and older. By race/ethnicity, enrollment grew among Asian (7%), Black (8%), Filipino (3%), Hispanic (4%), Multiethnic (7%), and White (+26%) student groups. Noncredit enrollment also increased in the Fall 2025 term, with a 4% rise in headcount (from 14,976 to 15,586) and 9% increase in total enrollment (from 27,254 to

29,828). Course modality distribution shows 49% of classes are offered remotely, 43% in person, and 8% in a hybrid format. Remote classes have the highest fill rate (83%), followed by hybrid (73%) and inperson (72%) classes.
